Soon after the school year began, the cast for the Senior play, "Dear Ruth", was chosen. Everyone worked hard at rehearsals to make the play a good one. Mr. Gould, who was formerly a professional director on Broadway, did a wonderful job in directing the play and used his talent to make it a big hit. It was held two nights with a full crowd attending each performance. There were also journals given out each night which were supported by the ads we went around and sold. Another great event to our year's credit was the winning of the B-1 League Championship. Though we did not win the Suffolk Champion, the boys did their best and displayed good sportsmanship throughout the season. They ended the season with a record of 13 wins and 3 losses. Chris King was given Honorable Mention for the All-Scholastic Suffolk Team and he also came in second for the scoring title of Suffolk, while Bill Ruescher came in fifth in that line. We have enjoyed our four years at Central Islip High School and wish to thank with sincere gratitude the teachers, friends, and classes, who've supported us through these past four years and for helping us to mold our future and make our lives a success. Our special thanks are extended to Miss Mannix and Mr. Muhvich, our Senior Class Advisors; Mr. Gould, who directed our Senior Play; and to Mr. Shertenlieb, our Principal, from all of us. Because of you, these years will long be remembered.

## Prophecy

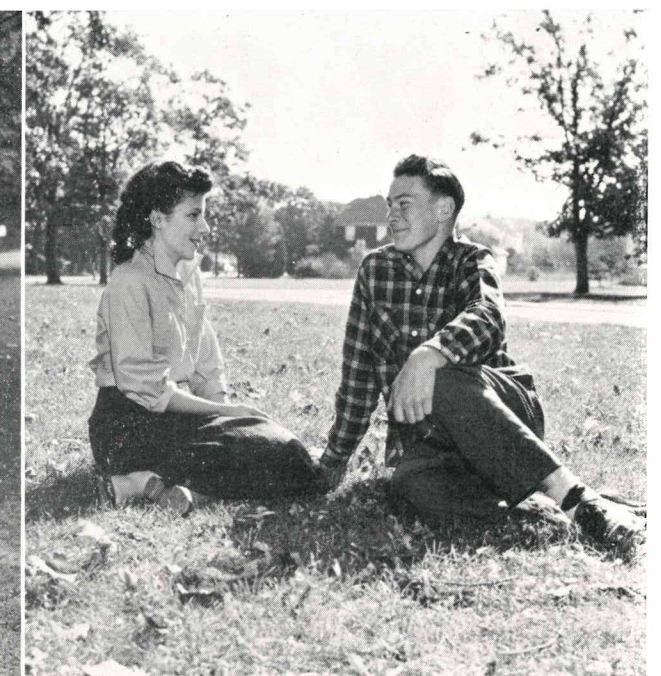
We are amazed to see J. Bensen, B. Myott, H. Urie and W. Hollings about to jump from 100 feet into a damp sponge.
